**Kommentar**

**Kommentar** Perhaps no other literary movement has been as transformative for the modern world as Romanticism. Informed by the political revolutions in America, France and Haiti, the agricultural and industrial revolution in Britain as well as the Napoleonic Wars, the Romantics set in motion a radical movement which positioned itself against the norms and literary forms of expression of the Enlightenment, embraced subjectivity as the dominant poetical position and regarded the imagination as the supreme faculty of the mind. This lecture series aims at connecting the political and social events of the period with its diverse literary forms of expression, covering Romantic poetry, novels and drama. It will draw on new approaches in Romanticism studies, which have long moved away from focussing on the "Big Six", namely William Wordsworth, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, William Blake, Percy Bysshe Shelley, John Keats and Lord Byron, and are nowadays informed by a more inclusive, broader understanding of the Romantic canon as well as critical impulses from gender studies and postcolonial studies.

**Kommentar**

In the much-decried era of 'fake news' and 'alternative facts,' this course addresses the seemingly inseparable connection of American news media and political rhetoric. In the first part of the term, we will address some of the most important and influential 'media moments' that reflect on and shaped the cultural-historical trajectory of the United States. In order to discuss the controversial role of print, broadcasting, and online journalism from the 18<sup>th</sup> century until today, we will examine political pamphlets from the revolutionary period, newspaper articles that link the Spanish-American War to yellow journalism (Joseph Pulitzer's *New York World*; William Randolph Hearst's *New York Journal*), and examples of investigative journalism ('muckraking') in newsmagazines of the Progressive Era (Ida Tarbell, Lincoln Steffens, and Ray Stannard Baker for *McClure's* and *The American Magazine*). Focal points for broadcasting journalism will include war reportage during the Vietnam War, *The Washington Post* and the Watergate scandal, and media coverage of 9/11.

Since the class objective is to discuss news media in their functions as reporting observers, intrusive participants, and agenda-setting 'fourth estate,' we will in the second half of the term discuss the connection between journalist rhetoric, including a focus on populism, and today's (digital) news outlets. In this regard, we will address contemporary broadcasting media such as MSNBC, CNN, and Fox News, online political news magazines and blogs such as huffingtonpost.com, politico.com, breitbart.com, fivethirtyeight.com, and drudgereport.com, independent journalism on webpages such as propublica.org, factcheck.org, and politifact.com, as well as news comedy and political satire (e.g. *The Daily Show with Jon Stewart*, *The Colbert Report*, *Last Week Tonight with John Oliver*, theonion.com, thespoof.com, etc.). A final list will be posted on Stud.IP at the beginning of the semester.

This is the first in a series of four lecture courses offered consecutively over a period of two years. It is designed to acquaint students with the literature and culture of North America.

rica from the late sixteenth- through the early nineteenth-centuries, i.e. the period of exploration and settlement, the American Revolution, the Early Republic, and the Age of Jackson. We will discuss some of the exemplary texts from these periods, analyzing their characteristic forms and themes as well as the history of their interpretation. Specific attention will be paid to key literary concepts, debates, and interpretive methodologies. We will also discuss important issues such as the role of religion in American culture and the separation of church and state; the theory and practice of federalism; enlightenment notions of commerce; slavery; western expansion; and the wars waged against Native American tribes. We will read examples of the sermon, epic, mock epic, occasional poetry; philosophical, religious, revolutionary, and anti-slavery tracts; travel narratives, captivity narratives, pamphlets, broadsides, dramas, speeches, letters; excerpts from early novels; and we will discuss contacts and exchanges between native and colonial cultures and the translation/transcription of traditionally oral tales. Students should walk away from this course with a deeper understanding of the various cultural traditions and innovations that helped lead to new nationhood, and with knowledge of the first literature to self-consciously call itself American.

The two-semester lecture series aims at introducing students to major approaches, traditions, and key figures in the fields of cultural and media theory. The second part of the lecture series, "Approaches and Methods in Media Studies," will focus on media theory, visual culture, material culture and cultural studies. The lecture will be concerned with media history, the relation between (mass) media and society, media aesthetics, models of communication, and questions of cultural memory, technology, materiality and embodiment. Other relevant issues are medial configurations of time and space, networks and systems, concepts of hyperreality, postmodernity and the digital. We will also consider theories of single media: photography, the cinema, television, the computer and mobile media.

The lecture will introduce a number of key texts and major schools that have been influential in the development of critical media and cultural studies: The Toronto School, the Frankfurt School, German media theory, British Cultural Studies, theories of postmodernism and visual culture, film and television theory, theories of material culture, systems theory, and actor-network theory.

Individual lectures are concerned with selected key thinkers, such as Theodor W. Adorno, Walter Benjamin, Jean Baudrillard, Bill Brown, James Carey, Richard Dyer, John Fiske, Stuart Hall, Mark Hansen, Miriam Hansen, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, Max Horkheimer, Harold Innis, Fredric Jameson, Friedrich Kittler, Bruno Latour, Marshall McLuhan,

Jason Mittell, Laura Mulvey, John Durham Peters, Claude Shannon, Raymond Williams, or Geoffrey Winthrop-Young.

**Kommentar** This course is about the division of labor between syntax and semantics. We will focus on linguistic phenomena that have been used to support covert syntactic operations and semantically motivated unpronounced elements such as indices or complex traces. We will compare this approach to analyses from the Categorial Grammar tradition that permit a direct interpretation of the surface structures, but require a more powerful, less restricted set of semantic operations.  
 Topics include quantifier scope, issues in the semantics of pronouns (e.g. weak crossover effects and 'paycheck' pronouns), ellipsis in coordination, reconstruction effects in wh-questions and relative clauses, and the hypothesis that intensional constructions involve covert world/situation pronouns.  
 In order to understand the techniques needed to account for these phenomena in the semantics, and the empirical consequences of both approaches, we will read parts of Pauline Jacobson's textbook "Compositional Semantics: An Introduction to the Syntax/Semantics Interface" (2014) and contrast the analyses discussed there with proposals from the recent research literature.

Kommentar	Many of the world's languages allow the subject of the sentence to be unexpressed, a phenomenon known as "pro(noun) drop". In a language like Italian, Gianni parla "Gianni speaks" and Parla "(S)he speaks" are both grammatical sentences. This is in contrast to a language like English, in which not expressing the subject leads to an ungrammatical sentence: *Speaks. The difference between being and not being able to leave the subject unexpressed (or, to put it differently, to have a "null subject") has been related to the richness of the verbal paradigm of a language. Whereas Italian has six different agreement endings in the present tense, English only marks the 3rd person singular differently (with an -s affix, as in John speak-s). Although this correlation with rich agreement is pervasive, it does not successfully capture all the cross-linguistic variation that is attested. Languages like Japanese and Chinese, for instance, allow unexpressed arguments (including subjects) in the absence of any agreement. Trickier perhaps are languages that allow pro drop under certain conditions only. Some languages only allow it in certain but not all person/number contexts, such as Finnish or colloquial variants of German. In this course we will discuss the notion of pro-drop in its full breadth by investigating prominent and novel papers on this topic.

Kommentar	In literature, (most) text types, or genres, can be identified fairly easily. For instance, a poem is a <i>sonnet</i> if it adheres to a well-defined set of features. In daily life, we experience hardly any difficulties to identify a given text as <i>letter</i> , <i>obituary</i> or <i>joke</i> . On closer inspection, it may, however, be quite difficult to name and describe all of their characteristics. Therefore, the first objective of this seminar is to enable us to analyse texts and categorise them accordingly. The second objective of the course is to ask questions such as the following. Which text types exists in English? Which text types existed in Old and Middle English? Did they change over time and, if so, how? By answering these and other questions, we might learn, for instance, what distinguished an Anglo-Saxon <i>writ</i> from a <i>regol</i> or <i>tæcing</i> . **Kommentar** In the introduction to Ishtla Singh's textbooks, the history of the English language is likened to a "rags-to-riches story of the language with humble and savage beginnings which grew to become the medium of literary genius for Chaucer, Shakespeare and Milton and, eventually, to conquer the globe" (2005: 1). However, what if we let English, the language, tell that story? This is what the lecture attempts to do. We turn to texts such as the *Anglo-Saxon Chronicle*, the *Orrmulum*, Trevisa's translation of the *Polychronicon*, or Puttenham's *Arte of Poesie*, circumnavigate their autors and try to listen to what the language itself is able to tell. In doing so, not only will we learn about noticeable features of Old, Middle, and Early Modern English, but also about crucial developments that changed English from a bold synthetic Germanic language into a Romanised analytic one.

Another consequence is very serious. Language contact might mean language death for one of the involved languages. **Kommentar** In the introduction to Ishtla Singh's textbooks, the history of the English language is likened to a "rags-to-riches story of the language with humble and savage beginnings which grew to become the medium of literary genius for Chaucer, Shakespeare and Milton and, eventually, to conquer the globe" (2005: 1). However, what if we let English, the language, tell that story? This is what the lecture attempts to do. We turn to texts such as the *Anglo-Saxon Chronicle*, the *Orrmulum*, Trevisa's translation of the *Polychronicon*, or Puttenham's *Arte of Poesie*, circumnavigate their authors and try to listen to what the language itself is able to tell. In doing so, not only will we learn about noticeable features of Old, Middle, and Early Modern English, but also about crucial developments that changed English from a bold synthetic Germanic language into a Romanised analytic one.

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Kommentar	<p>In recent considerations of non-European literatures the concept of world literature has frequently replaced the notion of postcolonial literature. This replacement occurred not only because of the term's larger purview beyond the literature from formerly colonized regions. More importantly, postcolonialism was seen to have become obsolete and was even considered a hindrance to the full emancipation of non-European writing from the haunting grips of coloniality. Postcolonialism's implied politicity allegedly blocked a more egalitarian and stylistically oriented perspective on these literatures and kept them in the perpetual waiting room of serious literary consideration. In this seminar we shall problematize the narrative of an obsolescence of a postcolonial perspective for world literature. We will look at the continued presence of colonial legacies in even the most cosmopolitan of recent writings, will discuss theories of the postcolonial and of world literature and will consider their capacities to account for literary practice and global (political) imaginaries. The course will historicize the concept of world literature through readings of Goethe, Erich Auerbach and Edward Said. Throughout the course of the semester we shall also engage with the question of worldliness from a more theoretical perspective - associated with Jacques Ranciere and Bruno Latour - that sees worldliness not as cosmopolitan abstraction, but as the complex connection of seemingly discrepant entities across the planet. Such a conception of worldliness has to always engage with conditions of (post-)coloniality and global asymmetry that remain deeply inscribed into our every-day activities and imagination. A globalized literature that seeks to render this persistent worldliness into aesthetic experience will always inevitably have to engage in a postcolonial project.</p>
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A syllabus and reading list will be distributed in the first session.

**Kommentar**

Mary Wollstonecraft (1759-1797) is the author of *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman* (1792), which has earned her the accolade of mother of feminism, but she is also the mother of one of the best-known novelists in the English language, Mary Shelley. Mary Wollstonecraft was associated with the circle of radical dissenters and thinkers around Rev. Dr. Richard Price through whom she met her publisher, Joseph Johnson, who was to introduce her to the revolutionary writer Thomas Paine and to her future husband, the radical philosopher William Godwin. Johnson's commission for an eye-witness epistolary account of the French Revolution took her to France in 1792 where she became acquainted with the English and American circle of expatriates who were supporters of the Revolution, including Helen Maria Williams, and the American Gilbert Imlay, who would become her lover and the father of her first child. Wollstonecraft was a radical thinker and her work is a call for social and political reform, most pressingly for an improvement of the education of girls and the lives of women. We shall read her two *Vindications* (of the Rights of Men and of the Rights of Woman), excerpts from her eye-witness account of the French Revolution, her Scandinavian *Letters*, and her novel *Maria, or the Wrongs of Woman*, as well as other shorter texts and excerpts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please purchase your own copies of Mary Wollstonecraft's *A Vindication of the Rights of Men; A Vindication of the Rights of Woman; An Historical and Moral View of the French Revolution* (Oxford World's Classics); *Maria, or the Wrongs of Woman* (preferably the Norton edition or Oxford World's Classics), and an edition of *Letters Written during a Short Residence in Sweden, Norway, and Denmark* (these three editions are recommended: Penguin, ed. Richard Holmes, Oxford World's Classics, ed. Tone Brekke and Jon Mee, or the Broadview edition, ed. Ingrid Horrocks).

**Kommentar**

Perhaps no other literary movement has been as transformative for the modern world as Romanticism. Informed by the political revolutions in America, France and Haiti, the agricultural and industrial revolution in Britain as well as the Napoleonic Wars, the Romantics set in motion a radical movement which positioned itself against the norms and literary forms of expression of the Enlightenment, embraced subjectivity as the dominant poetical position and regarded the imagination as the supreme faculty of the mind. This lecture series aims at connecting the political and social events of the period with its diverse literary forms of expression, covering Romantic poetry, novels and drama. It will draw on new approaches in Romanticism studies, which have long moved away from focussing on the "Big Six", namely William Wordsworth, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, William Blake, Percy Bysshe Shelley, John Keats and Lord Byron, and are nowadays informed by a more inclusive, broader understanding of the Romantic canon as well as critical impulses from gender studies and postcolonial studies.

Kommentar	<p>In this course the sea takes center stage: The ocean, seaside towns, the lives on ships, from sixteenth-century explorers and the experience of the middle passage to contemporary beach cultures and sea traffic of people, goods, and garbage. We will also explore the sea as a habitat for many different species and consider how fiction, poetry, and (scientific) nonfiction depict the lives of sea creatures, maritime forms of cohabitation and struggles for survival. Texts to be discussed include early travel writings, including Olaudah Equiano's <i>The Interesting Narrative of a Life</i>. We will read portions of Herman Melville's <i>Moby Dick</i> and his tale <i>Benito Cereno</i> as well as poetry by Emily Dickinson, Walt Whitman, William Carlos Williams, Langston Hughes, Marianne Moore, Elizabeth Bishop, and others.</p> <p>Another concern of the course is the richness of life forms underwater, which have long been overlooked and underestimated. We will discuss nonfiction books that take seriously the intelligence, sentience, and emotional being of mammals, fish, and cephalopods: Jonathan Balcombe's <i>What a Fish Knows: The Inner Lives of Our Underwater Cousins</i>, Peter Godfrey-Smith's <i>Other Minds: The Octopus and the Evolution of Intelligent Life</i>, and Neil Shubin's <i>Your Inner Fish</i>, both a PBS series and a book, which traces human evolution back to the earliest forms of life on Earth—a fish that "crawled onto land 375 million years ago." Considering the evolutionary and ecological significance of the sea, we cannot ignore the ways that human enterprises impact maritime life in ever more harmful ways—through pollution, industrial fishing, and the destruction of maritime ecosystems; we will discuss these issues with regard to documentary films such as <i>A Plastic Ocean</i> (2016), <i>Sonic Sea</i> (2016), <i>Chasing Coral</i> (2017), and <i>Blackfish</i> (2013).</p> <p>Moreover, we will reflect how the sea has inspired the environmental imagination and philosophical thinking in two recent books: In Chloe Aridjis's <i>Sea Monsters</i> (2018), the ocean itself is seen to "write and rewrite its long ribbon of foam" while beaches suggest a "conversation between the elements." The novel reflects the lives of surfers, seafarers, and beachcombers as well as that of sunken ships at the bottom of the sea. Melissa McCarthy's <i>Sharks, Death, Surfers</i> (2019) offers a creative mediation on sharks in writing and art through a range of historical contexts.</p>

The overall aim of the course is to gain an understanding of the rich cultural imaginary of maritime life—from its fictional and documentary forms to its philosophical dimensions and ecocritical challenges.

Kommentar "America is now wholly given over to a damned mob of scribbling women, and I should have no chance of success while the public taste is occupied with their trash -- and should be ashamed of myself if I did succeed. What is the mystery of these innumerable editions of the "Lamplighter," and other books neither better nor worse? -- worse they could not be, and better they need not be, when they sell by the 100,000."

This is what an outraged, frustrated, and potentially envious (?) Nathaniel Hawthorne wrote to his publisher in 1855 about the (commercial) success of contemporary women's writing in America. These lines draw attention to questions revolving around literary taste, quality, and modes of writing that are - supposedly - contingent on gender.

This class sets out to discuss the origins and the dynamic development of this "damned mob of scribbling women" in the American literary scene of the nineteenth century, focusing on the variegated genres and styles of writing in American women's literature. While Hawthorne took issue with the highly popular sentimental literature of writers like Maria Cummins or Susan Warner in the mid-century, in reality, the modes of female writing were far more diverse, for example addressing gender inequality, promoting abolitionism and political participation, oscillating between the private and the public sphere, embracing or criticizing the concepts of 'true womanhood' or its successor, 'new womanhood,' in the last decades of the century.

In order to trace these topics and concepts, we will investigate theoretical texts that engage with the so-called "feminization of American culture" (Ann Douglas) in the nineteenth century, discuss different concepts of womanhood and their embeddedness in political and socio-economic discourses of the time, and then relate those discussions to selected American women's writings spanning from the 1820s and the years of Jacksonian democracy to the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. Our discussions will revolve around prose texts by Catharine Maria Sedgwick, Caroline Kirkland, Margaret Fuller, Susan Warner, Maria Cummins, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Harriet Jacobs, Harriet Wilson, Grace King, Kate Chopin, and Charlotte Perkins Gilman as well as poems written by Emily Dickinson or Lydia Sigourney (please note that this is a preliminary list which will be finalized and slightly condensed by the beginning of the winter semester).

A number of readings will come in the form of excerpts or single chapters; most texts will be made available in an e-reader via Stud.IP, but you are asked to purchase the following two novels which we will discuss in full length:

Catharine Maria Sedgwick's *Hope Leslie* (1827, Penguin edition preferred) and Harriet Beecher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin* (1852; Norton Critical Edition by Elizabeth Ammons preferred).

**Kommentar** William S. Burroughs (1914-1997), allegedly "the only American novelist [...] who may conceivably be possessed by genius" (Norman Mailer) and author of *The Naked Lunch*, the infamous "endless novel which will drive everybody mad" (Allen Ginsberg), has once been regarded as one of literature's most controversial and transgressive protagonists. Today, he seems to have made his way into the canon as a master avant-gardist, as an iconized counter-cultural figure, and as a trailblazer for contemporary pop culture.

This class will revisit Burroughs's aesthetico-political axioms and their philosophical implications from a contemporary perspective, not only by critically engaging with his work in the field of literature and beyond (incl. film and visual arts) but also by analyzing works by artists inspired by Burroughs's oeuvre such as Kathy Acker or Genesis Breyer P-Orridge (among others).

Texts will be made available to students. Active participation is required and expected.

Kommentar This course is about the division of labor between syntax and semantics. We will focus on linguistic phenomena that have been used to support covert syntactic operations and semantically motivated unpronounced elements such as indices or complex traces. We will compare this approach to analyses from the Categorial Grammar tradition that permit a direct interpretation of the surface structures, but require a more powerful, less restricted set of semantic operations.  
 Topics include quantifier scope, issues in the semantics of pronouns (e.g. weak crossover effects and 'paycheck' pronouns), ellipsis in coordination, reconstruction effects in wh-questions and relative clauses, and the hypothesis that intensional constructions involve covert world/situation pronouns.  
 In order to understand the techniques needed to account for these phenomena in the semantics, and the empirical consequences of both approaches, we will read parts of Pauline Jacobson's textbook "Compositional Semantics: An Introduction to the Syntax/Semantics Interface" (2014) and contrast the analyses discussed there with proposals from the recent research literature.

Kommentar	Many of the world's languages allow the subject of the sentence to be unexpressed, a phenomenon known as "pro(noun) drop". In a language like Italian, Gianni parla "Gianni speaks" and Parla "(S)he speaks" are both grammatical sentences. This is in contrast to a language like English, in which not expressing the subject leads to an ungrammatical sentence: *Speaks. The difference between being and not being able to leave the subject unexpressed (or, to put it differently, to have a "null subject") has been related to the richness of the verbal paradigm of a language. Whereas Italian has six different agreement endings in the present tense, English only marks the 3rd person singular differently (with an -s affix, as in John speak-s). Although this correlation with rich agreement is pervasive, it does not successfully capture all the cross-linguistic variation that is attested. Languages like Japanese and Chinese, for instance, allow unexpressed arguments (including subjects) in the absence of any agreement. Trickier perhaps are languages that allow pro drop under certain conditions only. Some languages only allow it in certain but not all person/number contexts, such as Finnish or colloquial variants of German. In this course we will discuss the notion of pro-drop in its full broadness by investigating prominent and novel papers on this topic.

Kommentar	In literature, (most) text types, or genres, can be identified fairly easily. For instance, a poem is a <i>sonnet</i> if it adheres to a well-defined set of features. In daily life, we experience hardly any difficulties to identify a given text as <i>letter</i> , <i>obituary</i> or <i>joke</i> . On closer inspection, it may, however, be quite difficult to name and describe all of their characteristics. Therefore, the first objective of this seminar is to enable us to analyse texts and categorise them accordingly. The second objective of the course is to ask questions such as the following. Which text types exist in English? Which text types existed in Old and Middle English? Did they change over time and, if so, how? By answering these and other questions, we might learn, for instance, what distinguished an Anglo-Saxon <i>writ</i> from a <i>regol</i> or <i>tæcing</i> . This will yield a general understanding of text types and what they tell us about the culture in which they are found.

Kommentar	Many of the world's languages allow the subject of the sentence to be unexpressed, a phenomenon known as "pro(noun) drop". In a language like Italian, Gianni parla "Gianni speaks" and Parla "(S)he speaks" are both grammatical sentences. This is in contrast to a language like English, in which not expressing the subject leads to an ungrammatical sentence: *Speaks. The difference between being and not being able to leave the subject unexpressed (or, to put it differently, to have a "null subject") has been related to the richness of the verbal paradigm of a language. Whereas Italian has six different agreement endings in the present tense, English only marks the 3rd person singular differently (with an -s affix, as in John speak-s). Although this correlation with rich agreement is pervasive, it does not successfully capture all the cross-linguistic variation that is attested. Languages like Japanese and Chinese, for instance, allow unexpressed arguments (including subjects) in the absence of any agreement. Trickier perhaps are languages that allow pro drop under certain conditions only. Some languages only allow it in certain but not all person/number contexts, such as Finnish or colloquial variants of German. In this course we will discuss the notion of pro-drop in its full breadth by investigating prominent and novel papers on this topic.

Another consequence is very serious. Language contact might mean language death for one of the involved languages. On a lighter note, one could answer the question "What are consequences of language contact?": <i>English</i> . Why? Because English "has been contact-derived from its very beginnings onwards" (Hundt/Schreier 2013: 1). In this seminar we will explore US art museums and the history of art museum architecture. Starting in 1870 with the opening of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, we will work through 150 years of US architectural history, ending most likely at the ongoing building project of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. In each session we will discuss one museum building/complex to trace local histories and challenges and the architectural solutions for them to then consider more abstract developments.

Discussing the institution and its history from a material perspective will open up new perspectives in understanding how art museums relate to their communities, their objects, their values. In this way, the very form of museums will function as a lens through which to discuss greater political, societal, and cultural shifts that occurred throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The development from museum buildings functioning as symbols that gesture towards past achievements of "Culture" to functioning as icons used to establish marketable brands, speak to general changes in US and Western society that we will trace over the course of this class. We will consider specific case studies of US art museum architecture, architectural theories as they relate to concepts of space, identity, authority, and the public, and some methodologies of cultural studies relating to representation, the public, and education.

Texts will be made available to students. Active participation is required and expected.

**Kommentar** This lecture series will focus on the heterogeneity of 20-century and contemporary Anglophone writing by introducing diverse literary and cultural traditions, among them those of Nigeria, South Africa, India, Canada, the Caribbean, Australia, New Zealand, and Ireland. With the help of key fictional narratives and selected non-fictional texts that illuminate the historical and political background against which these traditions developed, lectures will address the postcolonial negotiations of the heritage of empire, the establishment of an own identity, and, in some cases, the gradual shift towards transcultural and global literary writing.

Readings: selected short fiction (to be found in StudIP) and the following novels (to be acquired by students): Chinua Achebe, *Things Fall Apart*; Michael Ondaatje, *The English Patient*; Ruth Prawer Jhabvala, *Heat and Dust*; J.M. Coetzee, *Disgrace*; and Mohsin Hamid, *Exit West*.

**Kommentar** Perhaps no other literary movement has been as transformative for the modern world as Romanticism. Informed by the political revolutions in America, France and Haiti, the agricultural and industrial revolution in Britain as well as the Napoleonic Wars, the Romantics set in motion a radical movement which positioned itself against the norms and literary forms of expression of the Enlightenment, embraced subjectivity as the dominant poetical position and regarded the imagination as the supreme faculty of the mind. This lecture series aims at connecting the political and social events of the period with its diverse literary forms of expression, covering Romantic poetry, novels and drama. It will draw on new approaches in Romanticism studies, which have long moved away from focussing on

the "Big Six", namely William Wordsworth, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, William Blake, Percy Bysshe Shelley, John Keats and Lord Byron, and are nowadays informed by a more inclusive, broader understanding of the Romantic canon as well as critical impulses from gender studies and postcolonial studies.

Kommentar

In recent considerations of non-European literatures the concept of world literature has frequently replaced the notion of postcolonial literature. This replacement occurred not only because of the term's larger purview beyond the literature from formerly colonized regions. More importantly, postcolonialism was seen to have become obsolete and was even considered a hindrance to the full emancipation of non-European writing from the haunting grips of coloniality. Postcolonialism's implied politicity allegedly blocked a more egalitarian and stylistically oriented perspective on these literatures and kept them in the perpetual waiting room of serious literary consideration. In this seminar we shall problematize the narrative of an obsolescence of a postcolonial perspective for world literature. We will look at the continued presence of colonial legacies in even the most cosmopolitan of recent writings, will discuss theories of the postcolonial and of world literature and will consider their capacities to account for literary practice and global (political) imaginaries. The course will historicize the concept of world literature through readings of Goethe, Erich Auerbach and Edward Said. Throughout the course of the semester we shall also engage

with the question of worldliness from a more theoretical perspective - associated with Jacques Rancière and Bruno Latour - that sees worldliness not as cosmopolitan abstraction, but as the complex connection of seemingly discrepant entities across the planet. Such a conception of worldliness has to always engage with conditions of (post-)coloniality and global asymmetry that remain deeply inscribed into our every-day activities and imagination. A globalized literature that seeks to render this persistent worldliness into aesthetic experience will always inevitably have to engage in a postcolonial project.

Kommentar

Mary Wollstonecraft (1759-1797) is the author of *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman* (1792), which has earned her the accolade of mother of feminism, but she is also the mother of one of the best-known novelists in the English language, Mary Shelley. Mary Wollstonecraft was associated with the circle of radical dissenters and thinkers around Rev. Dr. Richard Price through whom she met her publisher, Joseph Johnson, who was to introduce her to the revolutionary writer Thomas Paine and to her future husband, the radical philosopher William Godwin. Johnson's commission for an eye-witness epistolary account of the French Revolution took her to France in 1792 where she became acquainted with the English and American circle of expatriates who were supporters of the Revolution, including Helen Maria Williams, and the American Gilbert Imlay, who would become her lover and the father of her first child. Wollstonecraft was a radical thinker and her work is a call for social and political reform, most pressingly for an improvement of the education of girls and the lives of women. We shall read her two *Vindications* (of the Rights of Men and of the Rights of Woman), excerpts from her eye-witness account of the French Revolution, her Scandinavian Letters, and her novel *Maria, or the Wrongs of Woman*, as well as other shorter texts and excerpts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please purcha-

se your own copies of Mary Wollstonecraft's *A Vindication of the Rights of Men; A Vindication of the Rights of Woman; An Historical and Moral View of the French Revolution* (Oxford World's Classics); *Maria, or the Wrongs of Woman* (preferably the Norton edition or Oxford World's Classics), and an edition of *Letters Written during a Short Residence in Sweden, Norway, and Denmark* (these three editions are recommended: Penguin, ed. Richard Holmes, Oxford World's Classics, ed. Tone Brekke and Jon Mee, or the Broadview edition, ed. Ingrid Horrocks).

**Kommentar**

Johnson's commission for an eye-witness epistolary account of the French Revolution took her to France in 1792 where she became acquainted with the English and American circle of expatriates who were supporters of the Revolution, including Helen Maria Williams, and the American Gilbert Imlay, who would become her lover and the father of her first child. Wollstonecraft was a radical thinker and her work is a call for social and political reform, most pressingly for an improvement of the education of girls and the lives of women. We shall read her two *Vindications* (of the Rights of Men and of the Rights of Woman), excerpts from her eye-witness account of the French Revolution, her Scandinavian *Letters*, and her novel *Maria, or the Wrongs of Woman*, as well as other shorter texts and excerpts which will be provided via Stud.IP. More importantly, postcolonialism was seen to have become obsolete and was even considered a hindrance to the full emancipation of non-European writing from the haunting grips of coloniality. Postcolonialism's implied politicity allegedly blocked a more egalitarian and stylistically oriented perspective on these literatures and kept them in the perpetual waiting room of serious literary consideration. In this seminar we shall problematize the narrative of an obsolescence of a postcolonial perspective for world literature. We will look at the continued presence of colonial legacies in even the most cosmopolitan of recent writings, will discuss theories of the postcolonial and of world literature and will consider their capacities to account for literary practice and global (political) imaginaries. The course will historicize the concept of world literature through readings of Goethe, Erich Auerbach and Edward Said. Throughout the course of the semester we shall also engage with the question of worldliness from a more theoretical perspective - associated with Jacques Rancière and Bruno Latour - that sees worldliness not as cosmopolitan abstraction, but as the complex connection of seemingly discrepant entities across the planet. Such a conception of worldliness has to always engage with conditions of (post-)coloniality and global asymmetry that remain deeply inscribed into our every-day activities and imagination. A globalized literature that seeks to render this persistent worldliness into aesthetic experience will always inevitably have to engage in a postcolonial project.</p>

Kommentar	Are you interested in the history of English literature? If you are a BA student, this course expects you to have completed module B.EP.202 Anglophone Literature and Culture II as a prerequisite. MA students usually have covered periods in English literary history in their previous degree programme. Are you now hooked on - or at least interested in - knowing more about English literature, its key texts, key authors and what makes them canonical? This self-study unit is designed to broaden and deepen your knowledge of two periods in the history of English literature with the help of books on literary history and anthologies. In particular, you will get a good overview of each period you are tackling, with in-depth information on what shapes the period itself, on authors and their texts, and on the developments within genres. At the same time you will experience that books on history are nothing to be afraid of - indeed, they can be positively enjoyable. (Not all of them are, but we will skirt around the ones that are extremely boring, prosy or ancient!)	

**Note that this is a self-study unit.** It expects students to work on their own, or in groups of two or three students. It is not a course that is taught on a weekly basis though it is organized around tasks to be completed on a week-by-week basis. Communication and feedback will be by email and in one-on-two meetings on Thursday mornings. As such, this course expects quite an amount of self-discipline on the part of the participants - but fear not, the unit is structured in such a way as to help you cope with this if you are willing to put some work in!
