Kommentar

This lecture series will provide an overview over Anglophone Literatures of the 20th century. It will introduce students to some of the central authors, texts, and tendencies of a seventy-year period that begins with the turn of the century and the death of Queen Victoria and ends with the international student movements of 1968 and the intellectual and aesthetic shifts that it inaugurated. Prominence will be given first of all to the modernist and avant-garde movements of the 1910s and 1920s. These movements and their stylistic and political radicalism will be analysed in a series of close readings and will be placed in a larger international and transatlantic context of modernism. Later in the term we will focus on the absurdist theatre of the post-war period and on the post-realist tendencies of British novel-writing in the 1950s. Developments and tendencies in literature will always be reflected in relation to other arts and with a view to their historical and social contexts, like feminism, class struggle, and the influence of the two World Wars. Finally, the lecture will pay close attention to the development of imperialism and decolonization in the 20th century and will end with an introduction to early Anglophone post-colonial literatures of various continents.

Before the term students are requested to purchase and have read Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Further reading will be announced in due course before the start of the term.

Kommentar

This third installment of the four-part lecture series, A Cultural History of American Literature, is devoted to literary modernism. Key authors include Henry James, Edith Wharton, Abraham Cahan, Willa Cather, Amy Lowell, Gertrude Stein, Robert Frost, Sherwood Anderson, Wallace Stevens, William Carlos Williams, Eliot, Pound, H.D., Marianne Moore, Zora Neale Hurston, Fitzgerald, Hart Crane, Ernest Hemingway, Langston Hughes, John Steinbeck, and Richard Wright, among others. Much of the course will be devoted to fiction, but we will also spend a great deal of time discussing poetry, one of modernism's privileged literary genres and certainly a laboratory for the kind of formal experiments also taking place in painting, sculpture, photography, cinema, and music. A major theme will be the emergence of a recognizably international avant-garde, cosmopolitan in its orientation and often revolutionary in its politics, and dedicated to shocking the "philistines" and the "bourgeoisie" out of their social and cultural complacency. We will approach modernism as an oppositional culture that was fueled by many, sometimes contradictory oppositional stances. The artists of the Harlem Renaissance saw cultural representation as a means of achieving political representation for African Americans; many female artists advocated women's rights; a number of artists urged personal liberation in matters of sexuality and lifestyle; and while some looked forward to the communist revolution, others endorsed traditionalism and even fascism. This course is designed to give a sense of the urgency and

diversity of an explosive half-century marked by extreme artistic innovation and torn apart by two world wars.

Kommentar

The two-semester lecture series aims at introducing students to major approaches, traditions, and key figures in the fields of cultural and media theory. The second part of the lecture series, "Approaches and Methods in Media Studies," will focus on media theory, visual culture, material culture and cultural studies. The lecture will be concerned with media history, the relation between (mass) media and society, media aesthetics, models of communication, and questions of cultural memory, technology, materiality and embodiment. Other relevant issues are medial configurations of time and space, networks and systems, concepts of hyperreality, postmodernity and the digital. We will also consider theories of single media: photography, the cinema, television, the computer and mobile media.

The lecture will introduce a number of key texts and major schools that have been influential in the development of critical media and cultural studies: The Toronto School, the Frankfurt School, German media theory, British Cultural Studies, theories of postmodernism and visual culture, film and television theory, theories of material culture, systems theory, and actor-network theory.

Individual lectures are concerned with selected key thinkers, such as Theodor W. Adorno, Walter Benjamin, Jean Baudrillard, Bill Brown, James Carey, Richard Dyer, John Fiske, Stuart Hall, Mark Hansen, Miriam Hansen, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, Max Horkheimer, Harold Innis, Fredric Jameson, Friedrich Kittler, Bruno Latour, Marshall McLuhan, Jason Mittell, Laura Mulvey, John Durham Peters, Claude Shannon, Raymond Williams, or Geoffrey Winthrop-Young.

Kommentar

In his classic study *The Desert* (1901), nature writer John C. Van Dyke solemnly stated that "The weird solitude, the great silence, the grim desolation, are the very things with which every desert wanderer eventually falls in love." His account of a long and solitary journey through the Southwest conceptualized the desert in an unprecedented way. Van Dyke pointed out the beauty of arid land, and made an argument for the preservation of its unique fauna and flora.

His publication was a reaction to recent economic developments, which not only had a profound impact on the region's environment but also changed its public perception. For a long time, the area comprising the Mojave, Sonoran and Great Basin deserts was considered to be an uninhabitable wasteland where only a few desolate pioneers could survive. Scientific explorations of America's arid and semi-arid regions from the late nineteenth century onwards, however, provided a different image. As the Southwestern dry lands were increasingly explored and mapped, they were made an integral part of a broader mythic narrative about economic possibilities in the West. The American deserts thus turned from a largely unused territory into a landscape of modern urban sprawl and economic investment.

Throughout the semester, we will explore the changing cultural imaginary of the American desert against the backdrop of historical events in the Southwest. We will read nineteenth-century pioneer travelogues (e.g. by Jedediah Strong Smith and John Wesley Powell), lyrical essays and short stories (e.g. by Mary Austin), nature essays (e.g. by John C. Van Dyke and Edward Abbey), among other historical sources, in order to examine how writers, travelers, and investors envisioned the desert landscape and its diverse social history with traces of Hispanic settlements and an ancient Native-American past. We will also analyze how these works have challenged or rearticulated conceptualizations of American culture and identity.

Excerpts of texts will be made available at the beginning of the semester.

Kommentar This introductory course intends to give an overview of the different fields of diachronic and synchronic linguistics (phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, lexicon and semantics), its terminology and methods. It introduces to the basic terms and tools for analyzing and describing the central grammatical structures of Old, Middle and Modern English to make the basic principles of language development and language change visible. Parts of the course will feature case-studies where students start making linguistic generalizations of their own.

Kommentar

Manuscript evidence from the Old English period suggests that there were four regional varieties of Old English: Northumbrian, Mercian, Kentish and West Saxon. Because of non-linguistic reasons, the latter became what, from our present-day perspective, could be called Standard Old English. After 1066 "and all that" English existed only as a spoken language for a considerable time. Again manuscripts provide evidence that in the Middle English period we can distinguish between Northern, West Midland, East Midland, South-Western and South-Eastern dialect texts. From the following period, the period of Early Modern English, up to the present we can also find texts composed in distinctive dialects. However, it was in the period of Early Modern English that the idea of uniformity in language becomes more explicit and more popular. Ever since, the language periods have produced works which help to standardise English. At the same time, the English language has gained a level of variation expressed by notions such as Celtic Englishes, New Englishes or World Englishes which is probably unmatched by most other languages.

In this course, we will turn to the complex history of English dialects in two ways. First, looking into each of the historical stages of the English language, we will discuss notable dialects and their linguistic features within the context of their period. This also includes a discussion of the historical development of marked PDE dialects. Second, we will try to answer questions such as: Were authors of earlier stages of English aware of variation in their contemporaneous English, or how did they describe language variation? By the end of the seminar, the students should be (more) receptive to experiencing language variation and approaching this with due expertise.

Kommentar

English historical linguists traditionally describe the era 1500-1700 as the period of Early Modern English. It is a period surrounded by crucial language-external events: the arrival of printing in England in 1475, the founding of the modern British state in 1707, the first records of English written in North America. It is a period in which contemporaries acknowledged that it is *a great advantage to waxe vniforme*. Trying to link literary and linguistic developments to language-external matter, we will explore different aspects of English as it developed in the period from 1500 to 1700. (Depending on interests, we might also venture to go beyond 1700 and trace selected developments up to the present day.) In this class, participants will gain an overview of the main issues concerning Early Modern English and learn how to read/approach Early Modern English texts in their original form.

Kommentar

Old English poetics is a surprisingly expansive field of study. It may start with the rules of rhythm and alliteration to which pre-Conquest poets adhered, but from there it soon balloons into a question of language history, as the architecture of the poets' metrical feet may reveal what syllables they pronounced and what consonants they felt were equivalent. In other words: with the necessary caveats, poetry both lays bare the linguistic history of Old English and offers a handle on the notoriously difficult question of dating Old English poetry. It furthermore has a great deal to say about lexicology, as the *wordhord* used by poets differed markedly from the prose lexicon, with a substantial proportion of words --- notably compounds, under pressure from metrical constraints --- found only in the poetry. And finally, the study of poetic form concerns itself with the distinction between prose and poetry, as late Old English preachers incorporated, however loosely, rhythm and alliteration into their homilies and saints' lives to a point where some of Ælfric's works are conventionally printed in verse lines.

In this course, students will gain a knowledge of prominent metrical and linguistic conventions of Old English poetry; they will gain an insight into the properties used to come to a relative dating of Old English verse; they will learn to recognize the trademark rhythmic and alliterative prose of Ælfric and Wulfstan; they will give thought to the lexical properties of Old English prose, verse, and rhythmic prose, and apply digital tools to the corpus of Old English to lay bare the differences between these categories; and they will translate excerpts from a range of Old English texts, with an emphasis on early poems such as *Beowulf* but with material for comparison from late verse and liminal categories. Online exercises will train their understanding of Old English scansion in the course of the term.

Interested students are advised to pick up a paperback or digital copy of Jun Terasawa's *Old English Metre* as early as possible and commence perusing it prior to the start of term so as to come in with a headstart.

Kommentar The winner of the 2017 Nobel Prize for Literature, Kazuo Ishiguro, looks upon a body of work spanning several decades. Among recurring motifs in his writing are *war* and *death*. Ishiguro, in the words of the Swedish Academy, "in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world". World War II and the dropping of the atomic bomb on his later town of birth, Nagasaki, may be seen as formative influential events.

Beyond said abyss, however, more positive aspects of "the human condition" are to be detected in his work. *Memory* and *love* are motifs equally important. While *memory* can serve as a destructive agent, it is also a giver of hope, and *love* is a reassuring force bridging the abyss and re-creating a connection that need not be illusory after all.

Virtual Canadian Studies (VCS) is a course programme offered by the Gesellschaft für Kanada-Studien e.V. The Anglophone Literature division is happy to import these courses, both to round off the topics and themes that we cover ourselves and to give students the chance to experience a different sort of teaching mode. After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in December of 1941 brooding racism within Canada and the USA found its outlet in the deportation and interment of Canadian citizens of Japanese decent living in the coastal regions of North America. We will be exploring this dark chapter of Canadian history with the aid of predominantly Japanese-Canadian authors, dwelling deep into the realm of fiction and memory. With the help of a diverse range of texts, from novel, to graphic narratives, children's books to memoirs, we will explore a Japanese-Canadian identity informed by the traumatic events around WWII that echo through generations.

Kommentar

Given the ongoing popularity of the Victorian Age in Britain and across its borders, we will inquire into the reasons for this fascination and investigate it critically relating it to heritage culture, the Empire, the relationship between past and present, and literary form and tradition. We shall have look at selected novels that have been labelled "neo-Victorian" in literary criticism. As critics have mentioned, "neo-Victorianism is more than historical fiction set in the nineteenth century. [...] texts (literary, filmic, audio-visual) must be in some respect be self-consciously engaged with the act of (re)interpretation, (re)discovery and (re)vision concerning the Victorians" (Heilmann and Llewellyn 4). All reading on the syllabus is obligatory. Attendance in the first session is obligatory.

Readings: Sarah Waters, *Affinity* (1999), Margaret Atwood, *Alias Grace* (1996), Ahdaf Soueif, *A Map of Love* (1999), and Lloyd Jones, *Mister Pip* (2006). Recommended introductory reading: Ann Heilmann and Mark Llewellyn, *Neo-Victorianism: The Victorians in the Twenty-First Century, 1999-2009* (2010). Further reading will be provided closer to the beginning of the teaching period.

Kommentar

This lecture series will provide an overview over Anglophone Literatures of the 20th century. It will introduce students to some of the central authors, texts, and tendencies of a seventy-year period that begins with the turn of the century and the death of Queen Victoria and ends with the international student movements of 1968 and the intellectual and aesthetic shifts that it inaugurated. Prominence will be given first of all to the modernist and avant-garde movements of the 1910s and 1920s. These movements and their stylistic and political radicalism will be analysed in a series of close readings and will be placed in a larger international and transatlantic context of modernism. Later in the term we will focus on the absurdist theatre of the post-war period and on the post-realist tendencies of British novel-writing in the 1950s. Developments and tendencies in literature will always be reflected in relation to other arts and with a view to their historical and social contexts, like feminism, class struggle, and the influence of the two World Wars. Finally, the lecture will pay close attention to the development of imperialism and decolonization in the 20th century and will end with an introduction to early Anglophone post-colonial literatures of various continents.

Before the term students are requested to purchase and have read Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Further reading will be announced in due course before the start of the term.

Kommentar

When Atwood published *The Handmaid's Tale* in 1985, no one could have foreseen its political relevance thirty years later. Together with its Man Booker Prize winning sequel, *The Testaments* (2019), and the Hulu TV series adaptation, Atwood's portrait of the patriarchal dystopia Gilead has not only garnered the critical attention of academic circles but has been a huge popular success and reached new and broader audiences.

In this class, we will discuss the (gender) politics and reception of the novels, the Hulu TV series adaptation, as well as their style of story-telling. We will contextualise our close reading of the novels in the political and ideological settings of the 1980s and 2010s, and we will establish a theoretical framework for our discussions by reading critical theory on intertextuality and adaptation.

It is mandatory to have read both novels before the beginning of the semester and it is advisable to have a fair knowledge of the TV series, as we will not have time to discuss it in its entire length. In addition to the required reading and viewing, assignments for the course **which will be taught online**, will include in-class presentations.

Kommentar

In the nineteenth century, the sensation novel was an extremely popular (and scandalous) genre and Wilkie Collins (1824-1889) one of its most famous practitioners. Sensation authors in general and Collins in particular mined the underbelly of Victorian society for plots: In sensation fiction, innocuous surfaces hide all kinds of secrets, violence, and crimes, waiting to be discovered in the midst of the respectable English middle-class home. As a close friend of Dickens, Collins also published short fiction and non-fiction in Dickens's *Household Words* and *All the Year Round* as well as other periodicals. These writings touch on similar themes as his novels but are rarely considered together with them. In this course we will read Collins's 1868 novel *The Moonstone* and discuss how it challenges contemporary Victorian hierarchies of race, class, and gender in a proto-detective plot. In addition to the novel, we will read examples of Collins's shorter fiction and journalistic pieces in their original *periodical contexts.

Readings: Wilkie Collins, *The Moonstone*. Students are expected to purchase their own copy and read the novel before classes start. Kommentar	<p>In this course, we will study environmental writing, from American Romanticism to the current literary concerns with the state of our planet, climate change, and the endangered futures of life (human and nonhuman) on Earth. While white nineteenth-century authors embraced nature and the wild as a realm outside civilization that was seen as a refuge from the world of industry, commerce, and growing cities, indigenous writers have always considered nature as part of their world rather than a place beyond. In the twentieth century, environmental writing and activism were closely related, part of a concerted effort to raise awareness for the fragility of ecosystems in the face of the nuclear age, industrial agriculture, and the uninhibited exploitation of natural "resources." Today, in the era of the Anthropocene, or more adequately, the Capitalocene, the impact of capital-driven industries, fossil fuel consumption, and environmental pollution have caused an increasing loss of habitats and a rapid decline of biodiversity that have brought our planet to the brink of another mass extinction.</p> <p>We will ask how concepts of nature, wilderness, wildlife, culture, and civilization have been represented in literature and visual culture from the nineteenth century onward, including fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. We will discuss texts by Henry David Thoreau, John Muir, Mary Austin, Rachel Carson, Wendell Berry, Annie Dillard, N. Scott Momaday, Leslie Marmon Silko, Terry Tempest Williams, Mary Oliver, W.S. Mervin, Linda Hogan, Barbara Kingsolver, Bill McKibben, Rebecca Solnit, Robin Wall Kimmerer, and Julia Corbett. We will also consider the way North American landscapes have been represented in painting and photography, from the Hudson River School to the photography of Subhankar Banerjee.</p> <p>Along with literature and visual art, we will consider (eco)critical approaches such as Lawrence Buell's work on the environmental imagination, William Cronon's challenge of wilderness as a concept, Rob Nixon's notion of slow violence, Ursula Heise's work on representing biodiversity and extinction, Ursula LeGuin's "Carrier Bag Theory of Fiction," Michael Pollan's concept of coevolution, Donna Haraway's ideas of kinship and companion species, and Stacy Alaimo's concept of transcorporeality.</p> <p>A syllabus and final selection of texts will be provided at the beginning of the term. Kommentar

SuzyPark, a court interpreter in New York City, is haunted by the recent murder of her parents with whom she fell out years ago. At 29, in the midst of another love affair that is leading nowhere and caught in a job that has become rather dull, Suzy is suddenly taken out of her boredom when a routine translating assignment reveals that her parents were not murdered by random violence, as the police had indicated. In the course of her own investigations, Suzy is faced with a seemingly sinister Asian American culture with its very own rules and practices.

Thus goes the - short version of a complex and intriguing - story of Suki Kim's *The Interpreter* (2003), a Korean American novel widely celebrated for its conflation of detective fiction, family novel, and contemporary Asian American identity politics in the new millennium. Kim's novel is illustrative of recent trends in Asian American literature and culture which, on the one hand, can be seen as a continuity of Asian American studies of the 20th century (with Maxine Hong Kingston as a major reference point), but which, on the other hand, break with well-established traditions and often transgress generic boundaries.

In this class we will be concerned with these recent trends and read selected Asian American texts (Chinese, Japanese, Indian, Vietnamese, as well as Korean American) which reflect the heterogeneity and fascinating newness of this literary field, disclosing perspectives on the various courses which contemporary Asian American writing charts in its defiance and subversion of the categories of mainstream and margin, exclusion and assimilation, high and popular culture.

Readings: Most texts will be made available in a reader (uploaded as PDF files to Stud.IP) at the start of the semester, but you are asked to purchase two novels as well as one story collection before the beginning of class: Suki Kim's novel *The Interpreter* (St. Martin's Press edition preferred) and Le Thi Diem Thúy's novel *The Gangster We Are All Looking For* (Anchor edition preferred), as well as Jhumpa Lahiri's collection *Unaccustomed Earth* (Vintage edition preferred).

Kommentar

Thousands of people have been lynched in the United States. Most of the victims were African American men. Though arguably lynching still occurs today, it reached epidemic proportions between 1877, the end of Reconstruction, and 1955, when the torture and murder of 14-year old Emmett Till brought national attention to the racist violence occurring primarily (but not only) in the South. Lynching, as in the Till case, makes a mockery of justice. The charges against the victim are usually trumped-up and often sexual in nature; the victim is denied any chance to defend himself; his murderers go unpunished. Unlike the Till case, lynching is usually staged as a public spectacle. Lynchers are traditionally proud of their work, tormenting their victims in front of crowds, posing for pictures with the grisly remains, even keeping body parts as souvenirs. The carnival quality of the savagery, clearly intended to celebrate racism and terrorize Black communities, creates a dilemma for literature dealing with the topic. How to represent the brutality of lynching without

reinforcing the terror and degradation it is meant to induce? The texts in this class adopt different strategies, as will our discussions. We will be analyzing fiction, nonfiction, and poetry in our attempt to understand both the brutal, historical fact of lynching and the various ways writers have tried to approach it.

Kommentar

Manuscript evidence from the Old English period suggests that there were four regional varieties of Old English: Northumbrian, Mercian, Kentish and West Saxon. Because of non-linguistic reasons, the latter became what, from our present-day perspective, could be called Standard Old English. After 1066 "and all that" English existed only as a spoken language for a considerable time. Again manuscripts provide evidence that in the Middle English period we can distinguish between Northern, West Midland, East Midland, South-Western and South-Eastern dialect texts. From the following period, the period of Early Modern English, up to the present we can also find texts composed in distinctive dialects. However, it was in the period of Early Modern English that the idea of uniformity in language becomes more explicit and more popular. Ever since, the language periods have produced works which help to standardise English. At the same time, the English language has gained a level of variation expressed by notions such as Celtic Englishes, New Englishes or World Englishes which is probably unmatched by most other languages.

In this course, we will turn to the complex history of English dialects in two ways. First, looking into each of the historical stages of the English language, we will discuss notable dialects and their linguistic features within the context of their period. This also includes a discussion of the historical development of marked PDE dialects. Second, we will try to answer questions such as: Were authors of earlier stages of English aware of variation in their contemporaneous English, or how did they describe language variation? By the end of the seminar, the students should be (more) receptive to experiencing language variation and approaching this with due expertise.

English historical linguists traditionally describe the era 1500-1700 as the period of Early Modern English. It is a period surrounded by crucial language-external events: the arrival of printing in England in 1475, the founding of the modern British state in 1707, the first records of English written in North America. It is a period in which contemporaries acknowledged that it is *a great advantage to waxe vniforme*. Trying to link literary and linguistic developments to language-external matter, we will explore different aspects of English as it developed in the period from 1500 to 1700. (Depending on interests, we might also venture to go beyond 1700 and trace selected developments up to the present day.) In this class, participants will gain an overview of the main issues concerning Early Modern English and learn how to read/approach Early Modern English texts in their original form.

Kommentar	<p>Old English poetics is a surprisingly expansive field of study. It may start with the rules of rhythm and alliteration to which pre-Conquest poets adhered, but from there it soon balloons into a question of language history, as the architecture of the poets' metrical feet may reveal what syllables they pronounced and what consonants they felt were equivalent. In other words: with the necessary caveats, poetry both lays bare the linguistic history of Old English and offers a handle on the notoriously difficult question of dating Old English poetry. It furthermore has a great deal to say about lexicology, as the <i>wordhord</i> used by poets differed markedly from the prose lexicon, with a substantial proportion of words --- notably compounds, under pressure from metrical constraints --- found only in the poetry. And finally, the study of poetic form concerns itself with the distinction between prose and poetry, as late Old English preachers incorporated, however loosely, rhythm and alliteration into their homilies and saints' lives to a point where some of Ælfric's works are conventionally printed in verse lines.</p> <p>In this course, students will gain a knowledge of prominent metrical and linguistic conventions of Old English poetry; they will gain an insight into the properties used to come to a relative dating of Old English verse; they will learn to recognize the trademark rhythmic and alliterative prose of Ælfric and Wulfstan; they will give thought to the lexical properties of Old English prose, verse, and rhythmic prose, and apply digital tools to the corpus of Old English to lay bare the differences between these categories; and they will translate excerpts from a range of Old English texts, with an emphasis on early poems such as <i>Beowulf</i> but with material for comparison from late verse and liminal categories. Online exercises will train their understanding of Old English scansion in the course of the term.</p> <p>Interested students are advised to pick up a paperback or digital copy of Jun Terasawa's <i>Old English Metre</i> as early as possible and commence perusing it prior to the start of term so as to come in with a headstart.</p>

It is a period surrounded by crucial language-external events: the arrival of printing in England in 1475, the founding of the modern British state in 1707, the first records of English written in North America. It is a period in which contemporaries acknowledged that it is *a great advantage to waxe vniforme*. Trying to link literary and linguistic developments to language-external matter, we will explore different aspects of English as it developed in the period from 1500 to 1700. (Depending on interests, we might also venture to go beyond 1700 and trace selected developments up to the present day.) In this class, participants will gain an overview of the main issues concerning Early Modern English and learn how to read/approach Early Modern English texts in their original form.

By mid-2020, crises such as a pandemic or anti-racism protests in the U.S. have made the literary industry change and adapt. New approaches and formats have developed: like many author reading tours, the Hay Festival went online; the number of book clubs and the frequency of their meetings has risen due to self-isolation; as a result of the anti-racism protests, subject-specific book clubs have been established, mirroring the greatly increased sales of books engaging with racism as well as the rise of subject-specific, widely published reading lists; during the pandemic, Amazon prioritises its non-book sales as well as ebooks, giving especially indie booksellers avenues not available before; J.K. Rowling is among those fostering the return of the serialised form.

We will collect, describe and explore these and follow-up developments as well as the institutions and formats of the literary industry with the tools of literary studies, including the interdisciplinary perspectives of sociology and philosophy. Centrally, we will read literary texts representing the literary industry and discuss their perspectives especially in view of current events. Creative writing will inform our work throughout the class to explore the dimensions of these novel developments as well as the great variety of experiences in the literary world with its readers, writers, publishers, event organisers, and many more participants.

Students choose and combine segments of the class according to their respective course of studies and their interests (this will happen in the first meeting). We meet every other week.

The *American Studies Journal* (ASJ) and its sister site, the *American Studies Blog* (ASB), are e-publications associated with Göttingen University Press. This class will investigate the publishing history of ASJ and ASB, involve students in the editorial process, and engage them in blog writing. Students will evaluate submissions to both sites and develop editing and peer critique skills. They will engage in discussions with practitioners such as representatives of Göttingen University Press, the editorial team of ASJ/ASB and other publications (e.g. the Berlin Journal issued by the American Academy Berlin and aspeers). Students will take first steps in developing a social media strategy by evaluating social media sites associated with ASJ/ASB.

This class will be a mix of online discussions and presentations and offline tasks (StudIP based). Students make a commitment to work independently or in groups and collect their completed tasks in a portfolio. They will

- prepare and deliver brief informal presentations on a specific aspect of our joint work such as manuscript assessment, editorial suggestions and media strategies.
- write and peer-critique a Blog post on a course-related topic (such as the history of publishing in the U.S., online publishing, University presses in the U.S. and Germany, an interview with a practitioner); successful blog posts will be published by ASB;
- analyze and develop a social media strategy (first steps) for ASJ/ASB publications.

Kommentar

In this course, we will study environmental writing, from American Romanticism to the current literary concerns with the state of our planet, climate change, and the endangered futures of life (human and nonhuman) on Earth. While white nineteenth-century authors embraced nature and the wild as a realm outside civilization that was seen as a refuge from the world of industry, commerce, and growing cities, indigenous writers have always considered nature as part of their world rather than a place beyond. In the twentieth century, environmental writing and activism were closely related, part of a concerted effort to raise awareness for the fragility of ecosystems in the face of the nuclear age, industrial agriculture, and the uninhibited exploitation of natural "resources." Today, in the era of the Anthropocene, or more adequately, the Capitalocene, the impact of capital-driven industries, fossil fuel consumption, and environmental pollution have caused an increasing loss of habitats and a rapid decline of biodiversity that have brought our planet to the brink of another mass extinction.

We will ask how concepts of nature, wilderness, wildlife, culture, and civilization have been represented in literature and visual culture from the nineteenth century onward, including fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. We will discuss texts by Henry David Thoreau, John Muir, Mary Austin, Rachel Carson, Wendell Berry, Annie Dillard, N. Scott Momaday, Leslie Marmon Silko, Terry Tempest Williams, Mary Oliver, W.S. Mervin, Linda Hogan, Barbara Kingsolver, Bill McKibben, Rebecca Solnit, Robin Wall Kimmerer, and Julia Corbett. We will also consider the way North American landscapes have been represented in painting and photography, from the Hudson River School to the photography of Subhankar Banerjee.

Along with literature and visual art, we will consider (eco)critical approaches such as Lawrence Buell's work on the environmental imagination, William Cronon's challenge of wilderness as a concept, Rob Nixon's notion of slow violence, Ursula Heise's work on representing biodiversity and extinction, Ursula LeGuin's "Carrier Bag Theory of Fiction," Michael Pollan's concept of coevolution, Donna Haraway's ideas of kinship and companion species, and Stacy Alaimo's concept of transcorporeality.

Kommentar

Suzy Park, a court interpreter in New York City, is haunted by the recent murder of her parents with whom she fell out years ago. At 29, in the midst of another love affair that is leading nowhere and caught in a job that has become rather dull, Suzy is suddenly taken out of her boredom when a routine translating assignment reveals that her parents were not murdered by random violence, as the police had indicated. In the course of her own investigations, Suzy is faced with a seemingly sinister Asian American culture with its very own rules and practices.

Thus goes the - short version of a complex and intriguing - story of Suki Kim's *The Interpreter* (2003), a Korean American novel widely celebrated for its conflation of detective

fiction, family novel, and contemporary Asian American identity politics in the new millennium. Kim's novel is illustrative of recent trends in Asian American literature and culture which, on the one hand, can be seen as a continuity of Asian American studies of the 20th century (with Maxine Hong Kingston as a major reference point), but which, on the other hand, break with well-established traditions and often transgress generic boundaries.

In this class we will be concerned with these recent trends and read selected Asian American texts (Chinese, Japanese, Indian, Vietnamese, as well as Korean American) which reflect the heterogeneity and fascinating newness of this literary field, disclosing perspectives on the various courses which contemporary Asian American writing charts in its defiance and subversion of the categories of mainstream and margin, exclusion and assimilation, high and popular culture.

Readings: Most texts will be made available in a reader (uploaded as PDF files to Stud.IP) at the start of the semester, but you are asked to purchase two novels as well as one story collection before the beginning of class: Suki Kim's novel *The Interpreter* (St. Martin's Press edition preferred) and Le Thi Diem Thúy's novel *The Gangster We Are All Looking For* (Anchor edition preferred), as well as Jhumpa Lahiri's collection *Unaccustomed Earth* (Vintage edition preferred).

Kommentar

Thousands of people have been lynched in the United States. Most of the victims were African American men. Though arguably lynching still occurs today, it reached epidemic proportions between 1877, the end of Reconstruction, and 1955, when the torture and murder of 14-year old Emmett Till brought national attention to the racist violence occurring primarily (but not only) in the South. Lynching, as in the Till case, makes a mockery of justice. The charges against the victim are usually trumped-up and often sexual in nature; the victim is denied any chance to defend himself; his murderers go unpunished. Unlike the Till case, lynching is usually staged as a public spectacle. Lynchers are traditionally proud of their work, tormenting their victims in front of crowds, posing for pictures with the grisly remains, even keeping body parts as souvenirs. The carnival quality of the savagery, clearly intended to celebrate racism and terrorize Black communities, creates a dilemma for literature dealing with the topic. How to represent the brutality of lynching without reinforcing the terror and degradation it is meant to induce? The texts in this class adopt different strategies, as will our discussions. We will be analyzing fiction, nonfiction, and poetry in our attempt to understand both the brutal, historical fact of lynching and the various ways writers have tried to approach it.

English historical linguists traditionally describe the era 1500-1700 as the period of Early Modern English. It is a period surrounded by crucial language-external events: the arrival of printing in England in 1475, the founding of the modern British state in 1707, the first records of English written in North America. It is a period in which contemporaries acknowledged that it is a *great advantage to waxe vniforme*. Trying to link literary and linguistic developments to language-external matter, we will explore different aspects of English as it developed in the period from 1500 to 1700. (Depending on interests, we might also ven-

ture to go beyond 1700 and trace selected developments up to the present day.) In this class, participants will gain an overview of the main issues concerning Early Modern English and learn how to read/approach Early Modern English texts in their original form.

Given the ongoing popularity of the Victorian Age in Britain and across its borders, we will inquire into the reasons for this fascination and investigate it critically relating it to heritage culture, the Empire, the relationship between past and present, and literary form and tradition. We shall have look at selected novels that have been labelled "neo-Victorian" in literary criticism. As critics have mentioned, "neo-Victorianism is more than historical fiction set in the nineteenth century. [...] texts (literary, filmic, audio-visual) must be in some respect be self-consciously engaged with the act of (re)interpretation, (re)discovery and (re)vision concerning the Victorians" (Heilmann and Llewellyn 4). All reading on the syllabus is obligatory. Attendance in the first session is obligatory.

Kommentar

This lecture series will provide an overview over Anglophone Literatures of the 20th century. It will introduce students to some of the central authors, texts, and tendencies of a seventy-year period that begins with the turn of the century and the death of Queen Victoria and ends with the international student movements of 1968 and the intellectual and aesthetic shifts that it inaugurated. Prominence will be given first of all to the modernist and avant-garde movements of the 1910s and 1920s. These movements and their stylistic and political radicalism will be analysed in a series of close readings and will be placed in a larger international and transatlantic context of modernism. Later in the term we will focus on the absurdist theatre of the post-war period and on the post-realist tendencies of British novel-writing in the 1950s. Developments and tendencies in literature will always be reflected in relation to other arts and with a view to their historical and social contexts, like feminism, class struggle, and the influence of the two World Wars. Finally, the lecture will pay close attention to the development of imperialism and decolonization in the 20th century and will end with an introduction to early Anglophone post-colonial literatures of various continents.

Before the term students are requested to purchase and have read Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Further reading will be announced in due course before the start of the term.

Kommentar

The winner of the 2017 Nobel Prize for Literature, Kazuo Ishiguro, looks upon a body of work spanning several decades. Among recurring motifs in his writing are *war* and *death*. Ishiguro, in the words of the Swedish Academy, "in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world". World War II and the dropping of the atomic bomb on his later town of birth, Nagasaki, may be seen as formative influential events.

Beyond said abyss, however, more positive aspects of "the human condition" are to be detected in his work. *Memory* and *love* are motifs equally important. While *memory* can serve as a destructive agent, it is also a giver of hope, and *love* is a reassuring force bridging the abyss and re-creating a connection that need not be illusory after all.

as well as ebooks, giving especially indie booksellers avenues not available before; J.K. Rowling is among those fostering the return of the serialised form.

We will collect, describe and explore these and follow-up developments as well as the institutions and formats of the literary industry with the tools of literary studies, including the interdisciplinary perspectives of sociology and philosophy. Centrally, we will read literary texts representing the literary industry and discuss their perspectives especially in view of current events. Creative writing will inform our work throughout the class to explore the dimensions of these novel developments as well as the great variety of experiences in the literary world with its readers, writers, publishers, event organisers, and many more participants.

Students choose and combine segments of the class according to their respective course of studies and their interests (this will happen in the first meeting). We meet every other week.

Kommentar

In the nineteenth century, the sensation novel was an extremely popular (and scandalous) genre and Wilkie Collins (1824-1889) one of its most famous practitioners. Sensation authors in general and Collins in particular mined the underbelly of Victorian society for plots: In sensation fiction, innocuous surfaces hide all kinds of secrets, violence, and crimes, waiting to be discovered in the midst of the respectable English middle-class home. As a close friend of Dickens, Collins also published short fiction and non-fiction in Dickens's *Household Words* and *All the Year Round* as well as other periodicals. These writings

touch on similar themes as his novels but are rarely considered together with them. In this course we will read Collins's 1868 novel *The Moonstone* and discuss how it challenges contemporary Victorian hierarchies of race, class, and gender in a proto-detective plot. In addition to the novel, we will read examples of Collins's shorter fiction and journalistic pieces in their original *periodical contexts.

Kommentar

This lecture series will provide an overview over Anglophone Literatures of the 20th century. It will introduce students to some of the central authors, texts, and tendencies of a seventy-year period that begins with the turn of the century and the death of Queen Victoria and ends with the international student movements of 1968 and the intellectual and aesthetic shifts that it inaugurated. Prominence will be given first of all to the modernist and avant-garde movements of the 1910s and 1920s. These movements and their stylistic and political radicalism will be analysed in a series of close readings and will be placed in a larger international and transatlantic context of modernism. Later in the term we will focus on the absurdist theatre of the post-war period and on the post-realist tendencies of British novel-writing in the 1950s. Developments and tendencies in literature will always be reflected in relation to other arts and with a view to their historical and social contexts, like feminism, class struggle, and the influence of the two World Wars. Finally, the lecture will pay close attention to the development of imperialism and decolonization in the 20th century and will end with an introduction to early Anglophone post-colonial literatures of various continents.

Before the term students are requested to purchase and have read Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Further reading will be announced in due course before the start of the term.

Kommentar

The winner of the 2017 Nobel Prize for Literature, Kazuo Ishiguro, looks upon a body of work spanning several decades. Among recurring motifs in his writing are *war* and *death*. Ishiguro, in the words of the Swedish Academy, "in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world". World War II and the dropping of the atomic bomb on his later town of birth, Nagasaki, may be seen as formative influential events.

Beyond said abyss, however, more positive aspects of "the human condition" are to be detected in his work. *Memory* and *love* are motifs equally important. While *memory* can serve as a destructive agent, it is also a giver of hope, and *love* is a reassuring force bridging the abyss and re-creating a connection that need not be illusory after all.

Kommentar

By mid-2020, crises such as a pandemic or anti-racism protests in the U.S. have made the literary industry change and adapt. New approaches and formats have developed: like many author reading tours, the Hay Festival went online; the number of book clubs and the frequency of their meetings has risen due to self-isolation; as a result of the anti-racism protests, subject-specific book clubs have been established, mirroring the greatly increased sales of books engaging with racism as well as the rise of subject-specific, widely published reading lists; during the pandemic, Amazon prioritises its non-book sales as well as ebooks, giving especially indie booksellers avenues not available before; J.K. Rowling is among those fostering the return of the serialised form.

We will collect, describe and explore these and follow-up developments as well as the institutions and formats of the literary industry with the tools of literary studies, including the

interdisciplinary perspectives of sociology and philosophy. Centrally, we will read literary texts representing the literary industry and discuss their perspectives especially in view of current events. Creative writing will inform our work throughout the class to explore the dimensions of these novel developments as well as the great variety of experiences in the literary world with its readers, writers, publishers, event organisers, and many more participants.

Students choose and combine segments of the class according to their respective course of studies and their interests (this will happen in the first meeting). We meet every other week.

Kommentar

This lecture series will provide an overview over Anglophone Literatures of the 20th century. It will introduce students to some of the central authors, texts, and tendencies of a seventy-year period that begins with the turn of the century and the death of Queen Victoria and ends with the international student movements of 1968 and the intellectual and aesthetic shifts that it inaugurated. Prominence will be given first of all to the modernist and avant-garde movements of the 1910s and 1920s. These movements and their stylistic and political radicalism will be analysed in a series of close readings and will be placed in a

larger international and transatlantic context of modernism. Later in the term we will focus on the absurdist theatre of the post-war period and on the post-realist tendencies of British novel-writing in the 1950s. Developments and tendencies in literature will always be reflected in relation to other arts and with a view to their historical and social contexts, like feminism, class struggle, and the influence of the two World Wars. Finally, the lecture will pay close attention to the development of imperialism and decolonization in the 20th century and will end with an introduction to early Anglophone post-colonial literatures of various continents.

Before the term students are requested to purchase and have read Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Further reading will be announced in due course before the start of the term.

Kommentar

In the nineteenth century, the sensation novel was an extremely popular (and scandalous) genre and Wilkie Collins (1824-1889) one of its most famous practitioners. Sensation authors in general and Collins in particular mined the underbelly of Victorian society for plots: In sensation fiction, innocuous surfaces hide all kinds of secrets, violence, and crimes, waiting to be discovered in the midst of the respectable English middle-class home. As a close friend of Dickens, Collins also published short fiction and non-fiction in Dickens's *Household Words* and *All the Year Round* as well as other periodicals. These writings touch on similar themes as his novels but are rarely considered together with them. In this course we will read Collins's 1868 novel *The Moonstone* and discuss how it challenges contemporary Victorian hierarchies of race, class, and gender in a proto-detective plot. In addition to the novel, we will read examples of Collins's shorter fiction and journalistic pieces in their original *periodical contexts.

Readings: Wilkie Collins, *The Moonstone*. Students are expected to purchase their own copy and read the novel before classes start. Kommentar

The winner of the 2017 Nobel Prize for Literature, Kazuo Ishiguro, looks upon a body of work spanning several decades. Among recurring motifs in his writing are *war* and *death*. Ishiguro, in the words of the Swedish Academy, "in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world". World War II and the dropping of the atomic bomb on his later town of birth, Nagasaki, may be seen as formative influential events.

Beyond said abyss, however, more positive aspects of "the human condition" are to be detected in his work. *Memory* and *love* are motifs equally important. While *memory* can serve as a destructive agent, it is also a giver of hope, and *love* is a reassuring force bridging the abyss and re-creating a connection that need not be illusory after all.

Kommentar Virtual Canadian Studies (VCS) is a course programme offered by the Gesellschaft für Kanada-Studien e.V. The courses are not taught face-to-face in a classroom at Göttingen University, but are held by way of a virtual classroom and chat sessions. The format is very different and takes some time to get used to, but it offers students the chance of communicating differently (and on a greater scope) than many in-class meetings do. The Anglophone Literature division is happy to import these courses, both to round off the topics and themes that we cover ourselves and to give students the chance to experience a different sort of teaching mode. We will be exploring this dark chapter of Canadian history with the aid of predominantly Japanese-Canadian authors, dwelling deep into the realm of fiction and memory. With the help of a diverse range of texts, from novel, to graphic narratives, children's books to memoirs, we will explore a Japanese-Canadian identity informed by the traumatic events around WWII that echo through generations.

Kommentar	"Class" has been a controversial analytical concept both in history and in the social sciences. This has been particularly visible in German academia where the most diverse intellectual currents have displayed a curious unity in decrying "class" as concept of social analysis. And yet, issues of "class" have seen a resurgence in recent years in both public and academic debate: often as clichéd elite prejudice, increasingly also as innovative

research initiatives. This course, a new addition to my "critical histories" seminar series, reengages with the work of one of globally most influential historians of class in the twentieth century: Edward Palmer Thompson (1924-1993). Thompson, working from within a Marxian tradition, focused his research on England in the late eighteenth and the early nineteenth centuries, i.e. the period of "industrialization" when the emergence of a new type of "working class" was a most visible and controversial development. He insisted that "class" was not a static "thing" but a historically evolving pattern of social and cultural relations. "The working class," he wrote, "did not rise like the sun at an appointed time. It was present at its own making." This approach led him to engage with "value systems" of workers that were transformed in the history of capitalism such as the democratic radicalism of the early labour movement, notions of time and work-discipline, the conflictual relationship of custom and law and, most famously, contradictory and changing "moral economies". Thompson insisted that the experience of labour was shaped by a social organization of production that was not restricted to a single cultural context but that the meanings workers attached to these experiences could not be uniform as they resulted from culturally specific eventful histories. If his research was, therefore, largely confined to the English context (excluding even Scotland and Wales), his work triggered new research initiatives around the world in the most diverse social settings. This seminar sets out to do two things. First, it will introduce students to some of the most influential of E.P. Thompson's highly original and suggestive historical writings. Second, it will trace the influence these writings had on the evolution of "social history" as a discipline the world over including more recent "rediscoveries" of E.P. Thompson's oeuvre that are linked to a renewed interest in labour history. The seminar and the connected tutorial (altogether 3 SWS) will be taught in English, though the seminar assignments can be submitted in both English and German.

This course is taught in a digital format without teaching in person.

Kommentar

The online course discusses social transformation in colonial and post-colonial India from a perspective of intersectionality. Gender norms were at the heart of colonial social policies, and an issue of intense public contestation and debate throughout the colonial period. The seminar sessions systematically look at gender - normative femininity and mascu-

linity, and different conceptions of a "third gender" - in relation to other structures of social power and inequality. These include (1) gender and the colonial "civilizing mission", (2) gender, caste and untouchability, (3) gender, labor, and household relations, (4) gender and nationalism, and (5) gender, sexuality, and reproduction. Moreover, the seminar introduces major feminist and social movements, which challenged the order of gender, and strove for social change. Thereby, the lens of intersectionality - a methodology building on US American black feminist thought - helps to bring out tensions and limitations of various projects of empowerment and social emancipation.

The course uses a format of online teaching which combines individual work with sources and literature (4 Text Response Papers) with video conferences and presentations (1 Video Presentation, 15 min), and students' peer review commentaries of video presentations.

Kommentar

Are you interested in the history of English literature? If you are a BA student, this course expects you to have completed module B.EP.202 Anglophone Literature and Culture II as a prerequisite. MA students usually have covered periods in English literary history in their previous degree programme. Are you now hooked on - or at least interested in - knowing more about English literature, its key texts, key authors and what makes them canonical? This self-study unit is designed to broaden and deepen your knowledge of two periods in the history of English literature with the help of books on literary history and anthologies. In particular, you will get a good overview of each period you are tackling, with in-depth information on what shapes the period itself, on authors and their texts, and on the developments within genres. At the same time you will experience that books on history are nothing to be afraid of - indeed, they can be positively enjoyable. (Not all of them are, but we will skirt around the ones that are extremely boring, prosy or ancient!)

Note that this is a self-study unit. It expects students to work on their own, or in groups of two or three students. It is not a course that is taught on a weekly basis though it is organized around tasks to be completed on a week-by-week basis. Communication and feedback will be by email and in one-on-two meetings on Thursday mornings. As such, this course expects quite an amount of self-discipline on the part of the participants - but fear not, the unit is structured in such a way as to help you cope with this if you are willing to put some work in!
